2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Yes. Walk with scholar and student support and programme have successfully finished during the year as part of Mentoring Programme. The Scholar Support Program, part of the 'New Initiatives in Higher Education' initiated by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Kerala aims at imparting additional support to students in circular areas of weakness. Subjects in which additional curricular support would be offered have been selected based on a result analysis work carried out based on results from the affiliated colleges of Kerala. As per guidelines of the college announced five courses for the programme for the first year students. They are English, Mathematics, Commerce, History and Chemistry. 40 Students were enrolled in the year 2017-2018. For the second year students the Courses offered are English, Commerce, Economics, statistics and Chemistry. 40 students were enrolled for this programme. Respective mentors handled the classes giving stress to tough portions of the courses. All the Classes were completed by the end of March 2018. Separate time table was prepared for the same. 20 hours were allotted to teach 10 students after the college hours with 1 hour duration. Classes designed in such a way that it should not affect their routine. Attendance was taken on a daily basis. It was noticed that some of the students were come from poor economic background, so special care taken by the mentor to give more focus on the paper. After the completion of classes, a class test was conducted by the mentor to find out the academic achievement of the students. Regular monitoring were provided to the students, so that it is easy for the students to grasp the matter easily. All the classes were completed by the end of March 2018. During the period timely direction were given to mentors to prepare study materials and give order for books to be purchased. All the mentors distributed study materials to scholars. The Programme gave opportunity to the weaker students to improve their study. 'Walk With Scholar' is a mentoring programme functioning under the "New Initiatives in Higher Education" of the department of Collegiate Education, Govt. of Kerala. The scheme introduces the idea of mentoring to under graduate students and builds on the concept of mentor as a 'Guide' and 'Friend'. Mentoring is a process where a mentor with great experience and wisdom guides the mentee to develop both personally and professionally. As the part of the programme, WWS 90 students were enrolled during 2017-18 academic year. 12 teachers of this college are deputed as internal mentors of these mentees.

The mentoring scheme is to be planned to identify available opportunities and select suitable areas for employment. The scheme also envisages in making the students competent to proceed and to evolve ways to achieve this targets of knowledge acquisition and employment .In Addition to lecturing and practical sessions ,the programme contains motivation visits and motivation camps.

Face to face discussions initiated, E discussion board was experimentally started and will be full fledged during next year. This institution believes firmly in continuous evaluation of the students for their sustained performance. Hence a structured evaluation process has been designed and implemented. The tests are prepared and conducted as per the University examination pattern. There is complete transparency in the internal assessment .The criterion adopted is as directed by the university. At the beginning of the semester, faculty members inform the students about the various components in the assessment process during the semester. The assessment test schedule are prepared as per the university and communicated to the students well in advance. Evaluation is done by the course handling faculty members with in one week from the date of examination. The corrected answer scripts at random are verified by HOD to ensure the standard evaluation process. The corrected answer papers of the students are distributed to them for the verification by the students .The marks obtained by the students in internal assessment tests are uploaded periodically on the university web portal along with their attendance. Noting the values in observation and validating the theoretical aspects student must submit lab record and assignments regularly. For lab course, the marks or grade scored by the student for the each experiment is indicated in the

observation book. The practical approach to the real time application is tested by viva-voce for laboratory courses. The end examination for the laboratory and projects shall be conducted with internal and external examiner appointed from the other colleges as decided by the university.

The College follows the Academic Calendar prepared and issued by the University. The same has been implemented during 2017-18. The College follows Academic Calendar prepared and issued by the university. It help students, faculty and staff remained of key dates throughout the academic semester and year. It promotes greater interaction between faculty and students. It also reduces the tendency towards course fragmentation. Because of the rhythm of work and rest is study learners can get more time. As the institution is named after the great universal saint Sri Narayana Guru, it upholds best values and ethics in whatever it does. The institution always tries to uphold the best teaching of the Guru Liberation through Education and it stands by it. The distinctiveness of Sree Narayana College Chathannur is its care and concern for socially/economically disadvantaged students. The College caters mostly to the higher education aspirations of Chathannur, a town with limited development by Kerala standards. Chathannur comes under Kollam (Lok Sabha constituency) and has an area of 18.5 Sq.km, with a population of 28855 (Male. 13775, Female. 15080). The population density is 1554/Sq.Km. The literacy is 91.68. The north and west is bounded by Ithikkara River. The locality has a sizeable population of socially and economically disadvantaged groups. There are many who are small-scale farmers, labourers, fishermen, house maids etc. There are many students who are the first from their family to enter portals of a Higher Education institution. Sree Narayana College Chathannur considers its distinctiveness as the care and sensitivity it exhibits for this disadvantaged group. This naturally follows from the vision of Sree Narayana Guru, the great saint-reformer after whom the College is named. His vision included empowerment through Knowledge and the College believes that the backwardness can be removed to a great extent through higher education. In the management quota, the college admits socially disadvantaged students, and where Government scholarships are inadequate, provides financial support, through fellowships by the teachers. Special classes are provided for the needy by the teachers, off college hours. Free breakfast and lunch is also provided for the needy from college staff fund. Each Department monitors the educational performance of the backward students. The staff advisors also encourage them to take part in extra-curricular activities to enable all-round development. Based on our consistent efforts, the pass percentage of SC/ST/backward students have improved by 53 in the reporting year.
