EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

CRITERION I

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The institution established under the Sree Narayan Trusts, Kollam keeps imparting knowledge to the entire society based on the great Guru's thought "Enlightenment through Education".

The college affiliated to the University of Kerala offers four under graduate courses and two post graduate courses. The UG courses are based on the Choice Based Credit and semester System and PG courses are following the Credit and Semester system. The curriculum for these courses is designed by the University and the institution strictly adheres to this and ensures the timely completion of this programme by following a well planned academic schedule. Though the institution directly doesn't have a role in developing the syllabus, suggestions and recommendations are conveyed to the curriculum designing committee through the elected representatives of academic council members.

The College gives priority to impart value-based education, which has effectively linked knowledge with moral values. To enhance students so as to meet the requirements for employability training programmes and personality development classes are organized for them with the support of additional skill acquisition programme and walk with scholar programme sponsored by the Government of Kerala. The institution regularly conducts seminars and workshops to familiarize the students and faculty with the latest developments in their subjects.

Along with curricular activities the institution also gives importance to nation building through the services of NCC and NSS units. ARSH club organizes health awareness programmes to the students. Women cell of the college organizes several programmes to empower the women students. The various clubs functioning in the college aims at the holistic development of students.

There is a feedback mechanism to ensure quality education to the students and to monitor the progress of academic activities.

CRITERION II

TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The institution maintains transparency in the admission procedure. The students are allotted to the college by the centralized allotment system of Kerala University. After a formal interview with the Principal and the admission committee the students are admitted to various courses. To ensure quality education, t the very beginning of the new semester an orientation programme is arranged for both the students and their parents to familiarize them with the CBCSS course and the method of evaluation. The class tutor collects the student's data and monitors their academic progress. The results of formative assessments and class tests help to identify the slow learners and the academically bright students. Accordingly remedial classes and enrichment classes are organized. Special attention is given to the disabled students to conduct extra classes, to provide extra time in examinations and to arrange class rooms and examination halls considering their convenience.

IQAC and CBCSS committee monitor the academic environment and the performance of students and their results. IQAC organizes academic improvement programmes and seminars to students as a part of quality education. IQAC also collects feedback from students and take remedial measures.

Realising the need to conserve our environment, awareness programmes are organized with the support of various clubs to the young generation and to the local public.

CRITERION III

RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Being a young college in the developing state, the institution promotes research activities of both faculty and students. Out of the 21 permanent faculty members 7 members have Doctoral degrees and eight members have M.Phil. degree. To promote research activities, a research cell is functioning in the college. This cell promotes faculty members to avail the support offered by various funding agencies to carry out research activities.

Six faculty members of our college are awarded with minor projects by the UGC. Another four members have submitted proposals for major/ minor projects. Our faculty members also published many research articles and edited books and proceedings. IQAC with the financial support of PTA sponsored annual seminar series ASPIRE to promote the research culture of students and faculty besides the National/ state level seminars.

Faculty members of all departments guide their students to carry out research work as a part of their project in the end semester.

As a part of extension activity NSS unit along with NCC and various other clubs organize awareness programmes, medical camps, blood donation camps and socio-econmic surveys aiming at the benefit of local people. These programmes also help to impart moral values among students.

CRITERION IV

INFRA STRUCTURE & LEARNING RESOURCES

The institution spread over 25 acres with four departments including two PG departments and one general department.Infrastructure facilities like audiovisual aids, models, internet connectivity and other resources for improvement of teaching-learning are augmented annually to keep up with the academic development of the College. The College has 13 spacious, wellventilated class rooms, 4 staff rooms, 2 laboratories, a centralized library and a seminar hall. All class rooms are connected to the Principal's chamber through a public address system. The College has a total of 31 desktop computers and 1 laptop computer with the latest configuration. All departments are provided with computers, LCD Projector, Printer and Internet connectivity. The library has around 10000 books, 2,000 reference books. All major news papers and periodicals, both Malayalam and English, are subscribed. The College Library is equipped with INFLIBNET. The College possesses excellent sports infrastructure. A well maintained play ground offers facilities for the practice of athletic events and games like Kabaddi, football, cricket etc. In addition to these, the College has a volleyball court and a badminton court. A hostel for women, with capacity to accommodate around 50 students is also available in the campus.

CRITERION V

STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The majority of the students of our College hail from rural areas with a low socio-economic background. The College offers various scholarships, endowments and free ships. Students are supported to avail the State/Central scholarships in time. Students in need are supported by various mentoring and assistance schemes like remedial classes, modification in teaching methodology, medical assistance, etc. Programmes designed by various Clubs functioning in the College help students to prepare for competitive examinations and to aim for higher studies. Life skill, communication skill and soft skill trainings are offered to the students. The elected Students' Union plays a significant role in all the activities of the College. All major academic bodies of the College have student representatives. Slow learners are supported by giving them special attention and encouraging a system of peer learning. Students are motivated to bring out print and manuscript publications. Innovative student support initiatives introduced recently, like 'Walk With a Scholar' (WWS) programme and 'Scholar Support Programme' (SSP) ensure specific mentoring to both bright and weaker students. Activities of various clubs and forums of the college produce fruitful results in student placement, facilitating entrepreneurship skills, excellence in curricular and extracurricular activities, etc. A great lot of achievements have been made by our students in sports and games.

CRITERION VI

GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The institution has a well defined decentralized and participatory organizational structure. This organizational structure has different units of statutory and non statutory bodies. The Manager of the Sree Narayana Trusts, being the Corporate Manager, is the prime authority of the institution. He heads the Governing Body which is the axis of various Committees and units that form a hierarchy. The Principal is chosen by the Management in strict adherence to the norms prescribed by the Government, the UGC and the University. The Principal administrates the College in tune with the policies and guidelines of the institution. Though he is invested with statutory powers to take decisions pertaining to academic and administrative matters, he does so in consultation with the College Council, or as the situation demands, with the academic Committee, Students Union, IQAC, PTA, etc. Decisions pertaining to academic matters are finalized in a participatory manner at the College Council or, if the situation so demands, the General Staff Meeting. This facilitates smooth and effective dissemination of information and execution of resolutions. Each Department is invested with administrative autonomy and is at the same time regulated by the College Council. Participatory leadership and team work culture that are handed down as a legacy to succeeding generations of staff reflect the core values and ethos of the institution, creates institutional loyalty and the willingness to walk the proverbial extra mile.

The socio economic survey conducted by our volunteers was highly appreciated by the Panchayat. By education Sree Narayana Guru meant the process of making one able and qualified for a better living in this world. Realizing the eternal significance of Sree Narayana Guru and his teaching, the institution aims at moulding a society of morally awakened, intellectually accomplished and socially committed citizens with humanitarian views.

MISSION

The mission of our institution is to impart quality education to students as well as to equip them according to the latest requirements. The institution also aims to ennoble our character by the progressive and harmonious developments of our physical, mental, intellectual and spiritual powers and impart it to all around for their welfare and prosperity.

- To inculcate human values and moral values in students.
- To train students so as to cope up with the latest requirements.

In the choice based credit and semester system (CBCSS), for the effective implementation of the curriculum classes are conducted as per a well planned teaching schedule. In the beginning of every semester, department wise meetings will be held to prepare the action plan for the new semester. While preparing this plan of action feedback received from students in the previous semester will also be considered. It will be the responsibility of the teacher to strictly follow the teaching schedule. Assignments / seminars etc. will also be conducted in the stipulated time period. There will be regular class tests/ assessment tests and one model examination at the end

of every semester. Head of the department will monitor the action plan. If there is any shortage in academic working days extra classes will be arranged to complete the course in time.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and / or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Teachers receive support from the college for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices in the following ways.

- The newly appointed teachers are motivated to attend Orientation programmes conducted by the academic staff colleges.
- Whenever there is a change in curriculum teachers are deputed to attend the workshops organized by University to familiarize these changes.
- Teachers are permitted to attend National/ state level seminars and refresher programmes to update their knowledge.
- Faculty members are promoted to pursue research activities and to avail FDP programme of UGC and to apply for Minor/Major research projects.
- Teachers are motivated to organize seminars and workshops in the emerging areas in their concerned subjects.
- College library provides enough reading materials and reference text books for the faculty.
- Internet facility is also provided to the faculty members.
- PTA supports faculty to invite resource persons and to conduct seminar programmes for the students.

The initiatives taken by the college for effective curriculum delivery are-

- Orientation programme is given to the first year students so as to familiarize

- Academic calendar will be given to the students.
- Assignments are given and the students are motivated to make use of the library facility and internet facility available in the college.
- Timely conduct of test papers and time bound evaluation help the students for self assessment and to realize the progress they have made in studies.
- LCD facilities are used for power point presentation and to screen movies and documentaries related to the curriculum.
- Internet facility is offered to the post graduate students.

For effective implementation of curriculum there is interaction between college and University, research bodies and Universities. In science subjects like Chemistry & Industrial Chemistry factory internship is a part of curriculum. Accordingly the department is in contact with industries like Travancore titanium ltd., English India clay company, Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala minerals and metals-Kollam, IRE- Kollam etc.

To arouse research aptitude in students, scholars from research institutions are invited and seminar programmes are conducted for the students.

The college is in touch with University and the faculty members attend workshops organized by University whenever a change in curriculum, mode of evaluation etc. is implemented.

Curriculum is designed by the University and there is only a partial role for the affiliated colleges. 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1. Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and institutions goals and objectives are integrated?

The curricula for different courses are framed by the University. Affiliated colleges have only a minor role in syllabus preparation. However the institution takes utmost care for the effective implementation of University's curriculum. The faculty members are deputed to attend short term programmes / workshops etc. conducted by the University. Seminars and workshops are organized by the institution to familiarize the faculty with the latest academic curriculum.

To supplement the University's curriculum the following steps are atken by the institution.

- Faculty members are deputed to attend orientation programmes / workshops conducted by the University when there is a syllabus revision/ modification in examination pattern etc.
- Industrial visits are arranged for the students.
- Orientation programmes are organized for the new students at the very beginning of an academic year.

The institution tries to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate change, Environmental education, Human rights, ICT etc. in to the curriculum through the various clubs functioning in the college.

• The women's cell and Arsh club conducts awareness classes for the teenagers.

- The Nature club/ NSS units /Science club and Bhoomitra sena club organize
 environment awareness programmes for the students. National service Unit of
 our college is trying to make our campus a plastic free eco friendly
 campuscampus.
- Legal awareness classes are provided for the students. Classes on Human rights are organized to the students with the help of Human rights cell.
- Our seminar hall is equipped with LCD / smart board and other IT related infra structure helps to provide ICT enabled teaching learning process.

1.3.4 What are the various value added courses / enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students.?

The career guidance cell and NSS units organize personality development classes and career guidance classes for the students. Walk with a scholar programme also offer classes to improve communication skill of students besides the career oriented classes aiming at the holistic development of students.

1.3.5. Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stake holders in enriching the curriculum?

Feedback received from students regarding syllabus are analysed and accordingly the same is intimated to the board of studies. In the department of Chemistry and Industrial Chemistry we have submitted a request for syllabus revision after the introduction of CBCSS system and the board of studies organsied one day meeting to discuss the issues and the syllabus revision is in progress.

In the same course students feel it difficult to complete the complementary Mathematics course in the prescribed time period. Efforts are made to bring this to the notice of the board of studies Mathematics so that there may be some changes w.e.f. next academic year.

- IQAC monitor and evaluate the curricular and co- curricular activities.
- College council analyse the results and performance of students and take appropriate measures if necessary.
- Planning board of the college also works in co –ordination with IQAC and it
 helps to improve the infrastructure facilities available in the college.

1.3.4. What are the contribution of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Curriculum is prepared and revised by the University. The college gives suggestions for improvement and modification of syllabus if required through board of studies members and elected representatives of academic council and syndicate members. With the introduction of CBCSS system in 2011, our faculty members actively participated in the syllabus design committee constituted by the University.

Yes

There is a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students. After analyzing these feed backs, it is communicated to the University through academic council members and board of studies chairman or other board members.

Two new courses were introduced in the college. In 2013-14 M.Sc. Mathematics course and in 2014-15, B.A. Degree course in History were started. Being a college located in rural area, there is a high demand for degree courses especially in arts subjects.

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1. How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Admission process is monitored by the Kerala University through the centralized admission system. Allotment of seats is strictly based on the merit as well as availability of seats. In case of seats allotted in the community quota, the number of seats available for various courses will be advertised in the news papers and in our website. After collecting application forms, merit list will be prepared and the same will be displayed in college notice board and admission will be given to the eligible candidates in accordance with the eligibility criteria prescribed by the University.

2.1.2. Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission to various programmes of the institution.

Our college offers degree courses in Science subjects/ Commerce and Arts subjects. Courses available in science stream are B.Sc. Chemistry and Industrial Chemistry and B.Sc. Mathematics. A candidate who passed +2 or equivalent examination with physics/Chemistry/ Mathematics / Biology is eligible to join these courses. In case of other courses, a pass certificate in +2 or equivalent examinations is the eligibility criteria.

Besides degree courses our college also offers post graduate courses in Commerce and Mathematics. Those candidates with a minimum 55% marks in undergraduate level are eligible to het corresponding PG courses.

2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

- 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard.
 - The institution admits differently abled students as per the University norms and always offers a helping hand to them. Some of the facilities given to the differently abled students are
 - Organising remedial classes if there is any difficulty in understanding the subjects.
 - Counseling is given to these students.
 - Scribe is permitted following University guidelines and rules.
 - Extra time is allotted to them in the internal as well as University examinations.
 - Seating arrangement is made in the ground floor.
 - Their participation is ensured in all the activities of college.

2.2.2 Does the institution access the student's needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If yes give details on the process.

As a part of the admission procedure the candidates have to attend a personal interview before the admission committee with Principal as the chairman. This committee accesses the knowledge level of students and his/ her communication skills. This face to face interaction also gives an opportunity to understand the family background of students and his previous track records and

talents. At the very beginning of the programme an orientation class is organized for the students as well as their parents.

Class tests are given to the students in the initial classes. This will help to find out the academically strong students and also so the slow learners and this program in turn will help to schedule the academic programme effectively.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and developed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge / remedial / add on / enrichment courses etc.)

The interview conducted at the time of admission and the tests conducted in the beginning of programme help to find out if there is knowledge gap between their qualifying examination and the newly opted course. The following measures are taken by the institution to avoid this gap

- Remedial classes are arranged for the slow learners in the morning hours as well as in holidays.
- The Scholar Support Programme (SSP) sponsored by the Higher Education Council,
 Government of Kerala, support the academically weak students. Special classes are
 organized for the students as per their choice and study materials are also provided to
 these students.
- English department conducts spoken English classes which help very much to improve the communication skill of students.
- NSS unit of our college conducts Additional Skill Acquisition Programme with the financial support of Higher Education Department, Government of Kerala.
- Counseling classes are also organized for the students.

2.2.4 How doses the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.

The institution always gives highest priority to issues like gender, inclusion and environment.

Various clubs functioning in the college works for sensitizing students on these issues.

Gender sensitization

The women's cell actively functioning in the college organizes seminars and awareness programmes for the girls as well as the boys. Seminars on women empowerment, gender equality etc. are organized by the women' cell. The tutor system effectively functioning in the campus help to solve the personal problems faced by students.

Inclusion

College situated in the rural background of Kollam district caters to the needs of students from all groups especially the economically and socially backward category. The equal opportunity cell functioning in the campus conducts programmes to uplift the marginalized sections of students. Strictly following the great guru's motto "One caste, One god One religion" there is no discrimination on the basis of caste. All the students are given equal importance and chances to participate in the various programmes organized by the college.

Environment

Our campus is declared as a plastic free campus. The NSS unit, Environment and nature club and the Bhoomitrasena club celebrates all the national/ international days related to environmental issues. These clubs conducts several awareness programmes.

The NSS unit conducts painting competitions to create an awareness among the students to realize the need to protect our environment. Students are encouraged to attend painting competitions/ quiz programmes/ seminars etc. conducted by other institutions and government agencies. Every year with the support of Kerala state forest department our students plants tree samplings inside and outside the campus.

As a part of curriculum the Chemistry and Industrial chemistry department of our college offers "Essentials of Chemistry" a paper giving much importance to the environment as open course to students from other streams.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

The meritorious students are identified based on their performance in qualifying examination as well as in the class test/ University examinations. As an appreciation and motivation the students are rewarded by the PTA as well as by the Staff association. Endowments are also given to the topper in English every year.

- After identifying the advanced learners, enrichment classes are provided to them.
- Reference books and challenging assignments are given to these students.
- They are encouraged to attend seminars / workshops etc.
- Seminars on advanced and emerging fields in their subject are organized aiming at these students.
- These advanced learners are included in a peer team to train the slow learners
- The PG students are motivated to attend competitive examinations like NET/ GATE etc.

2.2.6 How does the institution collect, analyse and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at the risk of drop out (students of the disadvantaged sections of society etc.)

The institution takes utmost care for the academic improvements of students. The data and information on the academic performance of students are collected from the marks scored in internal tests, grade scored in seminars/ assignments as well as by the end semester evaluation conducted by the University. The teacher in charge of the student and the head of the department analyse this data to grade students into different groups and accordingly remedial classes and enrichment classes are provided to these student.

PTA meeting gave an opportunity to the parents to see the performance of their wards and to make their suggestions.

To control the dropout rate of students, attendance is made strict. Monthly attendance statement are displayed on the notice board. If any student face a shortage in attendance the matter is considered seriously and the same is discussed with the candidate as well as his parents. Proper measures like counseling. Financial help in case of needy students etc. are arranged to avoid drop out rate. Being a rural area one of the major reason for drop out of girl students is getting married during the course.

2.3 Teaching – Learning Process

2.3.1. How does the college plan and organize the teaching, Learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

At the very beginning of an academic year the college prepares an academic calendar in accordance with the University schedule for the same period. The calendar clearly mention the number of working days and the dates for submitting assignments and tentative dates for conducting Internal examinations and University examination. The calendar will also be displayed on the website.

For effective implementation of teaching learning process, each faculty member prepares a teaching plan for the current semester and submit the same to the concerned head of the department. It is the responsibility of the head to ensure that the teaching plan is being implemented as per the schedule. In case if there is any lag in academic activities, extra classes are arranged to manage the same.

As a part of evaluation class tests and model examinations are conducted. These tests are conducted as per the University examination pattern. The results are evaluated timely and it is displayed on the notice board and the papers are distributed to the students. On the basis of result analysis, remedial classes are organized for the slow learners.

For evaluating students besides the performance in academic activities weightage is also given to his/ her behavioral aspect, communication skill, the role played for extracurricular activities like sports/ arts etc. , the social responsibility and participation in NSS, NCC, Nature club etc.

2.3.2. How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching – learning process?

Internal Quality Assurance cell ensure the improvement of teaching learning process. Various academic programmes are planned and implemented by the IQAC. The various duties performed by the IQAC are:

- To impart quality education, orientation programmes are arranged for the students and staff at the beginning of every academic year.
- Faculty members are encouraged to use Innovative teaching practices through ICT, audio visuals etc.
- Faculty members are motivated to attend Orientation / refresher programmes/ seminars / workshops etc.
- Departments are encouraged to organize seminars and workshops.
- PTA sponsored multi disciplinary seminar series ASPIRE is being organized annually by IQAC
- IQAC monitor and analyse the results of internal examinations as well as
 University examinations and takes appropriate measures to improve the
 results.
- Remedial classes as well as enrichment classes are arranged for the students.
- Aiming at the over all development of students, IQAC plans and organize personality development classes and awareness programmes.
- walk with a scholar and ASAP programmes are conducted to enhance the employability of students.
- IQAC also takes initiatives to collect feedback from students to improve the teaching learning process.

2.3.3. How is learning made more student- centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

To make the learning process student- centric, students are encouraged to take seminar programmes and to conduct discussions in class rooms. They are motivated to avail the ICT facilities available to make their presentations more attractive.

The multi disciplinary seminar series "ASPIRE" organized by the IQAC provides a platform for the students to present papers related to their project/ research works.

To promote collaborative learning, project works are assigned to a group of students. Assignments allotted to students and lecture notes prepared by them for presenting seminar papers help to develop the quality of independent learning among the students.

2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators?

As a part of curriculum students have to complete a project work in the final year. They are guided to trace out a particular field in their subject where they can do some innovative contributions. The research committee and science forum also organize invited talks so as to introduce recent advances in their subjects to the students. The National level seminars organized by the college provides an opportunity for students to realize potential of research works and this also act as a motivating force. Details of progarmmes conducted by the institution are given below.

The ARSH club and Health club conducts counseling programs for the students. Entrepreneurship development cell organize industrial visits and field trips and career classes for the students. Career Guidance cell conducts test series on a regular basis for the students so as to equip them to face the competitive examinations. The evaluation is also done and the toppers are rewarded. Walk with a scholar programme helps in mentoring the students.

2.3.8. Provide details of innovative teaching approaches / methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years?. What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning.

ICT enabled teaching method is introduced in the post graduate level. Use of smart class rooms helped the students to learn topics more effectively. Language lab established in the year 2012 makes provisions for the students to improve their communication skills.

The institution has a well stalked library with adequate titles covering the latest syllabus prescribed by the University. Library also offers reference books, newspapers, journals and magazines for the students. To prepare for seminars and to do project works and assignments students make use of the library. Since the timing of library is from 9.00am to 5.00 pm, students get sufficient time to access the library facilities.

Limited Internet facility is also provided in the library for the staff and post graduate students.

This help them to collect data related to research work and latest developments in their field of interest.

2.3.10.Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Normally the curriculum is completed in the stipulated time period strictly following the academic planner. Being a young college with only few staff members if any one avail leave for long time like maternity/ medical leave it become difficult to arrange classes. So guest teachers are appointed with financial support from PTA. When teachers are deputed to attend Orientation / refresher programmes other faculty members engage their allotted works. If there is any lag in academic programme due to hartals or strike, extra classes are arranged to manage the same.

Being a small college a healthy relation exists between the students and teachers. The students feel free to interact with their teachers and to discuss their difficulty if any faced in class rooms and to take necessary actions.

Yes, the college has introduced evaluation of teachers by the students. At the end of each semester feedback forms and well prepared questionnaire are given to the students. Principal collects the feedback forms, analyze it, if any valuable suggestions are there from the students side or if any modifications are required that will be implemented from the very next semester. PTA meetings are conducted at regular intervals and suggestions from parents are also given the due respect. At the end of every academic year faculty members are required to prepare and submit a self appraisal form.

2.5. Evaluation process and reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

In the beginning of every academic year an orientation programme is given to the first year students and to their parents. In this programme after introducing the choice based credit and semester system to the students/ parents, details regarding the evaluation process is also explained to them. In addition to this, the information regarding evaluation – distribution of marks for attendance/ assignments/seminars/ internal tests etc. are also published in the college calendar. Students are advised to browse University website frequently to see the latest information instructions of the University. To monitor the academic activities A CBCSS committee with a co –ordinator and department wise faculty advisors is constituted. This committee also gives timely instructions to the students regarding evaluation process.

2.5.2. What are the major evaluation reforms of the University that the institution has adapted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its

In 2010 -11 Kerala University introduced the Choice based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS) for the degree students in affiliated colleges. Accordingly the marks based analysis was replaced by the grading system for both internal and external evaluation. In the five point grade system, grades A,B,C,D and E are awarded to the students based on their performance. To pass a course the candidate must score a minimum D grade in the evaluation process.

Internal marks are awarded to students based on their attendance / assignments submitted/ seminar presentation and two internal tests. For the lab course, besides attendance performance in lab was taken as the criteria for assessment.

2.5.3. How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of University and those initiated by the institution on its own?

A team of CBCSS programme coordinator and faculty advisors are actively working in the institution to effectively implement the evaluation reforms of University. They are in constant touch with the University and if there is any change in evaluation process the same will be intimated to students in time. The students are also advised to visit the University website for the latest information. Our faculty members actively participate in the evaluation process conducted by the University.

2.5.4. Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Formative assessment is done on the basis of internal class tests/ assignments and seminar presentations. While evaluating students, their attendance, performance in class rooms and laboratories, behavioral aspects and their extracurricular activities are also given the due weightage. After conducting the internal tests, the results of the same are discussed with their parents. This had a positive impact and helped a lot to improve the performance of students in summative examination conducted by the University.

2.5.5. Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course / programme? Provide an analysis of the student's results / achievements (Programme / course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

College regularly monitor the performance of students in internal tests and end semester examinations conducted by the University. The internal results of students are communicated to their parents in the class wise PTA meetings. The results are also displayed on the college notice boards. After publication of University results, a staff meeting will be conducted to analyse the results and remedial measures if necessary will be taken to improve the quality of students. As an inspiration PTA honor the toppers in University / internal examinations by giving them prices in the form of study materials.

2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

Internal assessment of students is done in a systematic manner strictly following the Kerala University regulations. For each theory paper 20% mark is given as internal assessment marks. This mark is awarded to students based on their attendance, assignments submitted, seminar presented and on the basis of marks scored in written tests. In each of these different criteria, 100% transparency is maintained. At the end of every month attendance statement will be prepared and the same will be displayed on the notice board. The consolidated attendance statement will be displayed at the end of each semester. Valued answer papers will be returned to students for self assessment and if any discrepancy is there they can contact the concerned teachers, If the students are not satisfied they can contact the monitoring committee of CBCSS system. Mark lists duly signed by the candidates will be submitted to the University only after convincing students about their grades awarded. To avoid any type of mistakes while sending internal assessment marks, it is verified by a three tier monitoring system involving the teacher concerned, head of the department and principal of the college.

The communication skills of students and the way of presentation are given due weightage in seminars. Independent learning, books referred while preparing assignments etc are also considered while evaluating the assignments.

In lab courses, marks are awarded to the students based on their performance, curiosity and enthusiasm.

2.5.7. Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment / evaluations as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If yes provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes, the college and individual teachers use the following ways of assessment / evaluations as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning

- Marks scored in internal examinations
- Grade awarded to assignments
- Behavioural aspects.
- Understanding social responsibilities
- Voluntary participation in NCC. NSS and various clubs.
- Punctuality in submitting assignments.

Evaluation is done with 100% transparency and to address any complaint from students a three tier grievance redressal system is functioning in the college. At the first step grievances are addressed to the concerned faculty, If the problem is not solved there or if the candidate is not convinced he/she can contact head of the department or the college Principal. If the candidate is not satisfied he/she can contact the grievance redressal cell at the second level. If college redressal cell cannot find out a proper solution, the University grievance redressal system give proper advice.

In the University level provisions are there for re checking of marks, revaluation of answer papers and improvement of selected papers.

To achieve intended learning out comes we are following a well planned teaching learning process. Teaching is made more interactive and opportunities are given to students to present seminar papers which will help to improve their presentation skills. As a part of quality education, college arranges industrial/ factory visits, tour programmes etc. To make the students socially responsible they are encouraged to join NSS/NCC/ Nature clubs etc. functioning in the college.

As a part of assessment strategy, after every internal examinations the mark list will be prepared and the same will be displayed in the college notice board. After the declaration of University results, A staff meeting will be conducted to analyse the results and to take appropriate measures. The results of internal as well as University examinations will be communicated to the parents in the PTA meetings.

2.6.3. What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

The Career Guidance Cell of the college provides current career related information for students. This cell also conducts orientation programmes to help students to achieve their goals. Regular test series are conducted and prizes are offered to the toppers to motivate them.

Entrepreneurship development cell conducts training programme and industrial visit to the students.

On behalf of NSS various social surveys and orphanages visits are conducted which will help the volunteers to interact with people from different areas. Factory visits / industrial training programmes organized by the college help to develop a research mentality among the interested students.

The student learning outcome is assessed through continuous evaluation process. The academically poor students are identified and remedial classes are arranged for the students. At the same time college also offers enrichment classes for the meritorious students.

The feed back data collected from students help to realize the problems faced by students and to make necessary corrective measures. Suggestions from the parents side are also given the due respect and these are also considered while planning the academic programme.

The internal quality assurance cell and the college council ensures that the academic activities are on par with the vision of the institution. IQAC CBCSS monitoring committee reviews the performance of students in curricular and co – curricular activities.

Principal reviews the academic activities, maintenance of discipline etc. with the assistance of Staff council.

The curricular and co-curricular activities and the general discipline of the college are evaluated and reviewed by the co-ordination committee comprising of both teachers and students.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research scheme/projects?

Out of the 21 faculty members of this institution, 7 faculty members are Ph.D holders and 4 members are M.Phil. Degree holders. Two of our faculty members availed the FDP scheme of UGC and wawarded with Doctoral Degree of Kerala University Another faculty member of Commerce Department is availing FDP and is in the final stage of submitting research thesis. Measures are taken to encourage young faculty members to acquire doctoral degree in their area. The college has spend around Rs.4,50,000/- sponsored by UGC during 2014-15 for conducting seminar/workshops. In the last year a sum Rs. 7,00,000/- has received as grant for major/minor research projects. Proposal for Rs.20,00,000/- towards Minor/Major research projects is submitted to UGC for consideration and approval.

PTA sponsored seminars are conducted to familiarize students to the emerging fields related to their subjects. The annual seminar series "ASPIRE" offer a platform to the students to interact with eminent academicians and researchers. Faculty members are enthusiastic to organize State/National/International level seminars/Workshops.

The research committee encourages departments for subscribing research journals on their own interest and to make use of the INFLIBNET facility. Provision to access internet is provided to faculty members and post graduate students. These departments give opportunities to the PG students for participating in national/international Level seminars.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The institution is strictly and timely following all criteria issued by Kerala University for Choice Based Credit and Semester System in Under Graduate courses and Credit and Semester System in Post Graduate courses. Compulsory Project/Dissertation works are given to both UG and PG students at the final semester. Each PG students are advised to read research journals and books to enrich their knowledge on research. The college spread over 25 acres is situated in the rural area of Chathannur, Kollam district.

There are four main departments and well equipped laboratories to cater the needs of students.

The details of various facilities available are

 Class rooms: There are 12 spacious well ventilated class rooms with basic facilities like furniture, black/ green boards, light, fans etc. There are laboratories for Chemistry & Industrial Chemistry department and Physics department.

- Language lab: To enhance the communication skills of student, IT enabled language lab
 is also available.
- Computer lab: Mathematics department has a math lab with adequate computers and internet connectivity.
- Seminar Hall: One well furnished seminar hall which can accommodate 250 persons at a time and equipped with LCD projector, Smart board, audio system etc is available to conduct seminar programmes and other orientation programmes and meetings. This seminar hall is also used as a smart class room to conduct IT oriented classes and tutorials.
- Library: A centralized library with sufficient number of text books and reference books is an asset of our college. Students and teachers avail the library facility to improve their knowledge level. Every year new titles are added to the stack, as per the demands and the availability of funds. In addition to these research journals are also available which are useful for the post graduate students and researchers.

The management system of the college is well defined and participative. The college is managed by Sree Narayana Trusts, Kollam. The Principal, teaching and non-teaching staff are appointed by the management in accordance with Government and University norms. The management provides necessary infrastructure facilities time to time for the smooth functioning of the college.

PRINCIPAL

Principal is the academic and the administrative head of the institution and facilitates the overall development of students and faculties. He co-ordinates and supervises the curricular and co-curricular activities of the institution with the support of faculty and staff council. The Principal executes all the decisions taken by the Governing Council, Staff Council and all other committies. His leadership in other functions include interaction with stakeholders, motivating and guiding students and maintaining discipline.

Dr.P.K Sudarsanan is present the Principal of college. He has taken M.Phil. and Ph.D in Commerce. He has made valuable contributions in governance of the institution. His role as the head of the institution is manifold.

COLLEGE COUNCIL

The principal carries out his duties in consultation with college council consisting of the HODs, elected representatives of teachers and students.

FACULTY

The staff council, IQAC, Department council and staff meeting of teachers take a prominent role in the design and implementation of quality policy of the institution. The Principal and Staff Council monitor the curricular and co-curricular activities of the institution. Through IQAC faculty members participate in the design and implementation quality policy and plans. IQAC takes initiative for quality maintenance and enhancement. Different sub committees of the faculties deal with curricular aspects, teaching learning

evaluation, research, student support and progression and innovative practices have been constituted for making proposals and implementation of programmes ensuring quality.

The College has a well defined participative management system. The policy statements and action plan are formulated in accordance with the mission and vision of the institution, analyzed and finalized by management. The management formulated committees for co-coordinating and controlling the activities of the institution.

Regional Development Committee (RDC) always maintains close contact with the institution. They provide all types of assistance and support for performing the functions of the institution smoothly and efficiently.

The principal acts as co-coordinating link with various internal and external agencies. He maintains constant support with Alumni for the overall development of the institution.

The principal and staff council of the college conduct review meetings to monitor the curricular and cocurricular activities of the institution. The cell collects teacher evaluation and student evaluation details for the overall improvement of the institution.

The office administration of the institution is vested in the hands of head accountant who consult the matters with the Principal and co-ordinates the administrative function of the college.



The college is governed by Sree Narayana Trusts. The Principal works under the control of the Government, University and management. College council plays an important role in formulation of plans and policies connected with various aspects of the institution. The college council is constituted by Principal, Heads of departments, members of teaching staff, Librarian and Head Accountant.

Regional Development Council (RDC) plays an important role in the development of infrastructure facilities in the college. They act as a connecting link between the Principal and management. The plans formulated by the management are implemented through RDC.

Different clubs are functioning in college .ARSH, ED, Bhoomitra sena.etc are important among them. Each clubs conducts variety of programmes for the overall development of students.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

Teaching and Learning

The college is located in a remote area of Kollam District. The students of the institution belong to the weaker section of society who did not have any access to higher education. With the establishment of this college, many poor students got opportunity to higher education and thereby motto of the Guru is realized. Innovative teaching methods are introduced for enhancement of the teaching learning process. Teachers are instructed to maintain work diary and teaching plan. Students are encouraged to maintain a good relationship with teachers. Students are given permission to use library, laboratory and internet facilities.

Research and Development

After the introduction of new scheme known as Choice Based Credit and Semester System in UG and Credit and semester system under PG, students of UG and PG class have to prepare and submit their project report to University. The primary objective of this scheme is to motivate the students to Research activities. Teachers are permitted to take their M.Phil and Ph.D., under FDP basis. The teachers are encouraged to participate in seminars and workshops organized by various Colleges and Universities.

Community Engagement

The students and staff of the institution are giving much more importance to community services.NSS and NCC of the institution plays a prime role in community service. The awareness programmes related with diseases, natural calamities etc were conducted from time to time for the well being of public. The ARSH club of the college is very active in achieving this objective

Human Resource Management

Management gives great importance for providing proper teaching working environment in the campus. Management takes steps to motivate the workforce for getting the better output. Different types of appraisal methods are used for evaluating the performance of employees. Management gives much emphasis to students for getting better knowledge from the institution.

Industry interaction

We have no specific industry interaction other than yearly industrial visit conducted by Department of Chemistry and Commerce as part of their curriculum.

Permission is given to teachers to work as visiting professors in colleges under various universities.

The NSS unit along with Bhoomithra sena club and Nature club in association with Forest department takes consistent efforts to plant tree saplings inside and outside the campus. Thereafter the volunteers look after these plants and maintain an account of this as a part of

green audit of its campus. Efforts are done by the volunteers to maintain a medicinal garden also in the campus.

7.1.2. What are the initiatives taken by the College to make the campus ecofriendly?

The Nature club and Bhoomitra sena club co-ordinates the activities / initiatives taken by the college to make it eco friendly. As a first step towards this we have banned the use of plastic flux banners in the campus. Awareness programmes were conducted to make the students conscious that these non biodegradable plastic materials will reduce the productivity of nature. To the safe handing over of our environment to the future generation, more trees are planted inside the campus and students are motivated to plant trees off the campus also.

Some major steps taken by the institution to make the campus eco friendly are:

- Practicing green principles.
- In chemistry lab, the practical works are changed to micro scale analysis saving chemicals and minimizing pollution.
- Waste from laboratories are collected and disposed off carefully.
- E- wastes are disposed to auctioneers with the consent of management and according to government rules.
- Organizing green campaigns.

- Computers are provided for all departments.
- An interactive method of teaching is adopted
- A new software was purchased for the language lab for improving the communication skill of students.
- New books and journals are procured to meet the requirements of students and faculty.
- INFLIBNET was introduced.
- Regular conduction of class tests / seminars etc as per the academic planner.
- Faculty members are motivated to attend seminars / workshops etc.

7.3 The Best Practices

Some of the best practices of the college which need special attention are

Book Bank Scheme:

A free book bank scheme was introduced for the economically weak students. The books for the bank are contributed by the faculty members and the former students. One faculty member from each department assumes the responsibility of managing this scheme.

Plastic free campus:

The volunteers of NSS, Bhoomitra sena and Nature Club are working together to make the campus plastic free. The college discourage the student from using flux banners and plastic carry bags.

Green campus

Each student and faculty member nurtures at least one plant to make the campus green. This programme is monitored by the Nature club.

Blood donation camps:

To assure life saving blood in our blood banks red ribbon club of our college conducts blood donation camps in association with IMA, Kollam and District hospital, Kollam. Our volunteers especially girls actively participate in this camps and their sincerity to fellow beings were highly appreciated by the medical team. Besides these our volunteers donate blood to nearby hospitals in case of an emergency.

Social responsibility.

Our NSS volunteers conducts socio economic surveys in the college ward. After analyzing this the same will be submitted to the panchayat authorities for further necessary action.

Waste management:

College takes special care in handling various types of waste materials.

To minimise the chemical pollutants micro anylsis was introduced in the degree level practicals.

E- wastes are disposed to auctioneers with the consent of management and according to government rules.

College is planning to implement a bio gas plant for disposing the biodegradable waste materials.
